
RURAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF INMATES

THE YEAR OF GROWTH

Our programme for educating children of inmates has taken wings. It has widened its reach, and is covering new ground with every passing year. We now have crèches in 4 prisons (up from 2 in 2013). Till 2015, over 1600 children had benefitted from this programme. We are grateful to our supporters and donors for this.

OUR PRISON CRÈCHES

NURTURING YOUNG LIVES

In India, children below six years of age are allowed to stay with their mothers inside a prison. But there, they have to follow the rules and regulations meant for the inmates, and are thus liable to become victims to their parents conduct. Our committed staff provides these children an alternative lifestyle, one with quality care and nurturing in our crèche facilities, ensuring that they receive education, nutritious food, health care and emotional support.

2015 has been a year of celebration for the tiny-tots in our crèche, their mothers and our teachers. We saw many of our children advance from primary to secondary education, all excited and agog about their new books, uniforms, school bags and water bottles. We have bid them adieu with a heavy heart, but also with the joy of seeing them grow. And we have welcomed a fresh batch of children into our crèches last year — the Tihar and Gurgaon crèches (our older facilities) together enrolled 495 children, up from around 320 in 2014. Another 49 have joined our recently opened facilities in Ghaziabad and Faridabad. Many of these children were enrolled for a short term, but that has not deterred our dedicated team from helping them.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without the unstinting trust and support that we have received from all of you. Our children have new dreams in their eyes, and it is you who have given them — as well as us — the confidence to see them come true.



NEW BEGINNINGS

In 2015, the Foundation reached out to children in Faridabad and Ghaziabad prisons

The crèche in Faridabad prison

In Faridabad, our interventions had begun in December 2014. Before that, the prison had six children, just two of whom were eligible for the crèche. The crèche in-charge was a 48-year old inmate, who had studied only till class Xth. The crèche could only offer old and broken toys, wornout slates and torn books to the children.

The Foundation helped the prison authorities select a room. This room was whitewashed, and adorned with colorful curtains and furniture. Shiny cutouts were put up; brand new blackboards and mats added cheer to the room. An easier curriculum and interesting methods of play were introduced.

The crèche was inaugurated on 26th March 2015 by Mr. M. M. S. Bedi, Judge, Punjab and Haryana High Court, Chandigarh

In 2015, soon after its inauguration, the crèche enrolled nine children. The effect has been immediate. The children are so enamoured by their new crèche that they refuse to leave it even after their classes get over!

Dr. Kiran Bedi inaugurated this crèche on 5th May 2015. Before the Foundation intervened, the facility had 11 children who were only taught to write by a teacher appointed by the government — none of the children, however, could recognize the letters or alphabets they wrote! These children spent their time fighting with each other in a gloomy dirty room, filled with old and broken plastic furniture and tattered toys.

In December 2014, we stepped in. The crèche acquired fresh coats of paint, and new furniture, books, toys and teaching aids — besides a trained teacher and a helper. As we worked to live up to the hopes of the children, each small solution became a stepping stone towards the beautiful crèche that stands today in the jail.

In 2015, 40 children were enrolled in this crèche.

FROM INSIDE TO OUTSIDE SCHOOL

After the age of 6, children are not permitted to stay within prison premises & remain prone to much deprivation on being away from their parents. For such children, we facilitate formal boarding & education in missionary schools, along with helping to develop their physical, cognitive & emotional needs. This year, 6 children from Tihar, Gurgaon and Ghaziabad Prisons were admitted to our partner schools.

CHILDREN OF VULNERABLE FAMILIES (CVF)

MAKING DREAMS COME TRUE

This programme is targeted at children above the age of 6. These children are not permitted to stay with their mothers or parents within the prison premises, and often suffer because of this deprivation. For such children, the Foundation facilitates formal boarding and education in public, government and missionary schools. The aim is also to fulfill the physical, cognitive and emotional needs of the children.

The programme offers two kinds of support systems — residential and home support. The children are admitted in different schools after assessing their needs. The Foundation supports them as per their requirement — in most cases, this has been till higher education.

Thanks to this initiative by the Foundation and its supporters, many of our children have been granted the rare opportunity of turning the adversity of their lives into success stories. In 2015, as in the previous years, another batch of gifted youngsters has graduated from their respective schools and colleges and have gone on to join their chosen professions.

Residential schools

The Foundation's residential school facility is for children whose parents (or one parent) are in prison, and whose other family members are unable to take care of them at home. Six schools have partnered with the Foundation to offer this facility.

Home support

The only project of its kind in entire north India, India Vision Foundation's home support facility allows prison inmates' children to study while staying with their families. These children usually have someone to take care of them at home, but their families are not financially strong enough to support their education. The Foundation's project, hence, comes as a godsend for them.

The project opens a bank account in the name of each beneficiary or her/his guardian. A fixed amount of money is transferred monthly to the accounts. The child uses the money to pay school fees and develop other skills.

Bawana Community Centre and Youth ClubContinuing the good work

The Bawana Community Centre and Youth Club was built by the Foundation as a result of a felt need. In the early years of this project, we had a number of children from Bawana who were enrolled in the residential schools. These

children, once they returned to their respective homes after completing their class 12th, needed a place to meet, play, undergo guidance, etc. We gave them the Bawana centre, which now serves 56 such children.

What does the centre do?

- Conducts yoga, music, dance, spoken
 English and remedial classes
- Provides space for learning and playing after school
- Organizes workshops and learning sessions; nurtures leadership qualities and empowers the young
- Creates a digital children's-magazine every quarter
- Provides space for art and crafts practice centre

Alumni Meet

Old is gold

On 9th August 2015, we organized an Alumni Meet at Venkateshwara International School. The stated objectives were to reconnect with the youth from the programme, assess the solidity of the Foundation's programme and understand its challenges, and initiate data processing for future evaluation and research.

A study was conducted by psychologist Dr. Reema Kochar on what our alumnus thinks and believes in. The findings were an eye-opener. An analysis of the results showed that it was critical to support the children in their higher education as well. Also important were timely career counselling to the children as well as their parents, and more skill-building training as well as access to advanced specialised courses.

The study's findings have helped us redesign our work to give the maximum benefits. We have introduced regular counselling sessions, English language classes and vocational training. We have also launched the 'Hunar' project to give that last mile support to our children.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

Summer Camp

Fun, Frolic and Creativity

That's what it was for 15 days in the summer of 2015 for about 100 children whom India Vision Foundation hosted in a Summer Camp, in partnership with SOS Children's Village, Bawana. Resource people and trainers came from the Centre for Cultural Resources and Training, and under their able guidance the camp reverberated with the joy of the participating children who were offered training sessions on yoga, dance, music, and crafts. Various games and contests were also a part of this 15-day bundle of fun.

THE STORY OF RAHIM

Rahim was introduced to our CVF project as a 6th standard student. A child from one of Delhi's slums, he lived an unhealthy lifestyle and had turned into a drug addict because of the company he kept. The Foundation took him under its fold when his desperate and poor parents approached us.

Rahim demanded a lot of attention and care from us. With him, we realised that bringing about real change and transformation needed a tremendous amount of patience, tolerance and missionary zeal. Initially, following a request by his mother,

he was admitted into a de-addiction centre. Later, Rahim himself became keen to continue the treatment and emerged fully cured.

He did not have any grand expectations when he approached us to get some support for setting up a small jewellery design store. With the help of our stakeholders, we readily obliged: Rahim became a proud owner of a small store in one of Delhi's busiest markets. Today, he supports his entire family with his earnings from his business. His siblings are now going to school, thanks to him. His work keeps him busy, and away from drugs and bad company.

We wish Rahim all the best in his bid to change, grow and reach for the stars.

BUILDING CAPACITY AND SELF-ESTEEM

The Foundation had initiated its skill-building programme for inmates in Tihar, followed by Gurgaon prison. In fact, Gurgaon prison is now considered a model prison for the manner in which it has spearheaded prisoners' reformation with the help of the Foundation and its team. One of the programmes undertaken here was a tailoring course in partnership with Singer. Our work has shown immense impact on the inmates' lives, and we have extensive skill development programmes running in these two prisons at present.

Hunar – Rebuilding the Social Fabric

We now have a dedicated project — 'Hunar' — under which we have brought in all our skill development programme. The aim of the project is to provide skills to inmates so that they become financially independent once they leave the prison. Project Hunar also supports released inmates in reintegration in the society.

For this, we have to thank our corporate sponsors, who have stood by us through thick and thin — they have not only supported us financially, but also by providing us with equipment and training facilities.

And then there have been those dedicated individuals — our volunteers — who have toiled hard to create outstanding work with some of our Inmates.


THE STORY OF PRITESH SINGH

"I had come to Gurgaon with a dream in my eyes - that of working hard and making it big. That dream lay shattered on a rage-filled day in the summer of 2012, when I was arrested and sent to prison along with 146 co-workers on charges of rioting on the premises of the automobile manufacturing company which I worked for. For the next few years, Gurgaon's Bhondsi jail was to become my home.

I felt as if my entire life had collapsed around me. As if it had come to a stop. After three months of severe depression during which I rarely ventured out of my cell, I finally saw a ray of light - in the various activities and training classes that India Vision Foundation was conducting in the prison. I decided to make better use of my period of incarceration by learning new things - and I began by attending dancing classes. Very soon, my perseverance and dedication, suitably encouraged by the Foundation's staff, saw me being appointed the dance trainer. I did not stop here: I went on to participate in and learn from all the training programmes that the Foundation ran in the prison.

In March 2015, I walked out of the prison, a changed man, with an unbounded zest for life and an intense desire to help inmates. The Foundation saw in me someone who could add immense value to its work, and appointed me Project Coordinator in Ghaziabad's Dasna prison.

I have not looked back since then. In Dasna, I work with the Foundation's team to bring joy to the lives of those whose life I had once shared."

EXPANDING HORIZONS

The idea behind this training programme germinated at a meeting that Dr. Kiran Bedi and the Foundation's Director, Ms. Monica Dhawan, had with Mr. Parminder Rai, Director General of Haryana Prisons, in Chandigarh on October 17, 2015. Mr. Rai was extremely appreciative of the Foundation's work in Gurgaon prison, and was keen to extend it to other prisons in the state. A training programme for prison reforms, thus, took shape as a collaborative enterprise of India Vision Foundation and Haryana Prisons.

Within a month, the first phase of training had been planned: four training sessions were conceptualised, for a batch of 20 officers from various prisons of Haryana. The venue was the Gurgaon prison, whose officials provided a fully furnished training room, with all the requisite facilities.

The first training, a two-day programme – was inaugurated on November 17, 2015 by the DG and Dr. Kiran Bedi. Over two days, the programme incorporated both, a theoretical and a practical approach, along with discussions over specific case studies. In broad outline, it covered the following key delivery areas:

- 'Knowing Each Other', followed by participants' responses in an interactive session
- Legal bases of prison reforms along with a Q&A session with Dr. Kiran Bedi
- Exposure of ongoing reform activities in prisons for male inmates
- Exposure of ongoing reform activities for female inmates and their children
- Interactive session on the 'Tihar reform model & Management'
- Strategies for implementation of programmes

At the end of the session, certificates were given to the participants along with Dr. Kiran Bedi's books *Yeh Sambhav Hai* and *Fateh*, and a packet of chocolates made by the inmates.

We have successfully completed two training programmes till now. Their impact has been immediate. We have helped all the prisons begin yoga classes under the guidance of the Patanjali Foundation, and have collaborated with the ST Foundation for providing computer training in the prisons.

India Vision Foundation is well-suited to conduct this programme because of its credibility and its experience of two decades under the guidance of Dr. Kiran Bedi.

Dr. Kiran Bedi is well known for having initiated reform programmes in Indian prisons with far-reaching impacts. She played the stellar role in transforming Tihar Prison into Tihar Ashram.

The Gurgaon

prison has been extremely receptive to the Foundation's initiatives – thanks to the support provided by its Superintendent, Mr. Harinder Singh. This prison has been running a number of reform and skill-building programmes such as awareness building and adult education, yoga, computer education, stitching and tailoring, hairdressing, chocolate making, etc. It, therefore, provides the ideal facility for imparting practical training to prison officials on starting and running multiple programmes effectively.

A Word From Respected Director General of Prisons, Haryana







The aim of this programme, spearheaded by Navjyoti India Foundation, as our lead partner, is to sensitize, train and empower the community to lead the change. Through a range of initiatives. From assisting women and counseling families, to intervening to solve environmental problems. In 2015, we expanded our reach to rural communities, and were able to reach many more people.

RURAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

FABRIC OF SUSTAINABILITY

Under our Community Development Programme, we have been able to assist more than 1,200 women through the Women Empowerment Programme; about 2,500 families through our Family-Community Counseling Programmes; and about 4,000 villagers through environmental interventions. What did we do in 2015




